BULL PROFILE: SANDRA LORRAIN MINUS

The Miami Northwestern Class of 6t5 has been blessed with members who have made indelible imprints on many factions of our society. Our classmates have impacted the community in the fields of religion, education, business and finance and health sciences just to name a few. With a graduating class of close to 600 classmates, few of us have knowledge of the paths that many of our fellow classmates took after graduation. There is however one who has. That one is Sandra Lorrain Minus, affectionately known as the Griot of our class. In most West African traditions, a griot is one who absorbs and maintains great knowledge about history and cultural traditions of a people or group. Sandra is by far the most knowledgeable classmate on the whereabouts, the family connections and the plight and status of hundreds of our fellow classmates. She is a walking encyclopedia on who married whom, who lives out of state, who is well or sick etc. She has the

contact information for hundreds of classmates and regularly communicates with many of them. As our class approached and prepared for various past events (Reunions, Holiday gatherings et.al.). Sandra would be responsible for locating and communicating the plans to countless classmates whom no one **EXCEPT Sandra**, had any inkling as to their whereabouts.

When asked how she amassed so much knowledge and information on so many people, She states simply" I have a real good memory. When I speak to people and they give me information, I remember it". Sandra was born on May 21, 1947, in West Palm Beach, Florida to parents of Bahamian descent. Her Bahamian accent still permeates as she laughs and responds to question about today's youth, She responds by saying "child don't get me started on that"! As we talked about her life and her past, her remarkable memory shown through as she recalled her experiences at Jackson Toddler Inn and Liberty City Primary school, which was located at the present day Charles R. Drew Elementary School. Sandra even recalled the announcement while in 7th grade at Dorsey Junior High School that the city of Miami had grown to 1 million residents. Again, displaying her remarkable memory.

The eldest of 10 siblings, Sandra began her post high school education at Miami Dade Junior College studying Nursing. She later worked for a short period at City Laundry. In 1969, Sandra applied for and was one of the first two African Americans to be trained in and pass the Civil Service Examination to be an operating room technician at the then still highly segregated Jackson Memorial Hospital. She worked at Jackson for 38 years before retiring in October of 2007.

She shared with me that she was so unhappy her initial year that she contemplated quitting and relayed those sentiments to her GODMOTHER, Ms. Lula Mae Monroe, whom she says gave her some choice words before insisting that she keep that GOOD Job. She credits MS. Monroe with teaching her the value of a good career.

Having been a pioneer in gaining professional employment at Jackson Memorial, she witnessed the many changes that African Americans were able to force by their excellence and competence in the performance of their duties. Indeed, she takes great pride in knowing that she helped to bring about this positive change for her people as well as setting a sterling example for her younger brothers and sisters.

Sandra has been a lifelong member of the National Church of GOD. She enjoys decorating and hosting retirement parties at first rate hotels, a task that she gleefully performed for retiring colleagues while she was still employed at Jackson. She is also quite skilled in making floral arrangements.

Sandra never married but is and has been a second mother to a host of nieces and nephews. She serves as the matriarch of her family just as she serves as that guiding light for our class. She remembers, like no other among us, those long forgotten golden bulls that are so happy that someone still keeps tabs on them, their families and their lives. Sandra so aptly stated her source of motivation when she said." My goal has always been unity and communication to keep our class strong and relevant for the kids and for the communities from which they've come".


Class of 6T5 Scholars

On Tuesday, May 24th, our president Vandene Tisdol Samuel and her daughter Inga attended the awards day ceremony. We were able to give our signature, four (4), \$1,000 scholarships to **Arianna Rolle** and **Maliek Collier**.

Lead by scholarship committee chair, **Dr. Clarence Jones**, and indispensably aided by Inga Samuel. seven (7) applications for our 2 scholarships were received and evaluated.

Arianna, an honor student from 9th—12th grade, has been accepted at Tennessee State University in Nashville, TN, the alma mater of several of our classmates. Her 'dream profession' is to be a neonatal nurse, majoring in nursing with a minor in music. Maliek has been accepted to Alabama State University, where he will pursue sports medicine or business. His own shoulder surgeries from sports injuries is leading him toward sports medicine.

The required essay from the applicants was "How Life Changed During the Pandemic, and What Are Your Hopes for the Future". Both of our scholars gave introspective answers that revealed the special challenges for students to live through the quarantine. Our policy is to require each recipient to submit a class schedule in order to receive the first disbursement, and, grades and the new class schedule for the next year.
